MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR



Wildlife Habitat Canada is in the thirty-sixth year of funding conservation projects across Canada. A visionary, federal legislative agreement between Environment and Climate Change Canada turns the funds raised from the **Canadian Wildlife Habitat Conservation Stamp** (affixed to the Migratory Game Bird Hunting Permit) into wildlife habitat projects from coast to coast.



Conservation groups of all sizes partner with us on these important projects. In 2019-2020, **36 projects totaling \$1,280,000 received funding through the Habitat Conservation Stamp Initiative.** Contributions from the Stamp leveraged more than \$6.4 million in additional partner funding.



A recent Audubon report published in the Journal Science suggested bird numbers are declining in North America. The good news in the report was a rebound in waterfowl numbers. I feel the work of Wildlife Habitat Canada and our partners has helped waterfowl numbers increase.

The Stamp, which provides the funding for our conservation grant program, has not had a price increase since 1991.

This means that each year, with rising costs and expenses, we have fewer and fewer dollars to support important on-the-ground conservation activities.



Many of you and your groups have worked with us in the past to **demonstrate and** advocate for the importance of an increase to the price of the Stamp. It is time to renew those efforts. Write or talk to your Federal Members of Parliament on the need for an increase in the price of the Conservation Stamp. This of course means that the cost to purchase a Permit/Stamp will increase slightly, but it is important to note that **the increase** to the Stamp will go towards projects to conserve wildlife and habitat.

The new initiative I introduced in last years' annual report (the **Land Trusts Conservation Fund**, under the federal Natural Heritage Conservation Program) had a very successful first year. 31 projects by 22 Canadian land trusts were supported by the LTCF, which **protected over 3,300 hectares of important habitat that is expected to benefit more than 60 species at risk.** This project depends on the Nature Conservancy Canada and local and regional land trusts teaming up to purchase special properties where rare plant and animal habitats are found.

Organizations and Boards need to regularly review and renew their operations and objectives. I am pleased to report that the Board and staff of Wildlife Habitat Canada have just completed a **revised Strategic Plan**, with our thanks to the many partners who contributed in the process.

Boards are ever evolving and changing and I would like to thank Travis Ripley, Brad Potter, and Serge Larivière for their commitment to Wildlife Habitat Canada for the past number of years. I am pleased to share that Dr. Blair Adams has joined the Board to represent the Eastern Provincial Wildlife Directors, and Laura King and Ian Barnett have joined us as Directors at Large.

STAMP AND PRINT PROGRAM

2020 ARTIST: DJ CLELAND-HURA

The 36th Canadian Conservation Stamp features the stunning Northern Pintail duck, which last graced our Stamp in 1988. The original art piece "Come Spring - Northern Pintail" by DJ Cleland-Hura has been selected as this year's Canadian Wildlife Habitat Conservation Stamp and Print.

DJ has been a featured instructor at Pixar Animation Studios, Vancouver Film School, and the Animation Workshop in Denmark. His concept work, as well as lighting and colour design, has contributed to a number of film projects including "Finding Nemo", "Ballerina," and "Space Chimps."

DJ has designed fantasy artwork for the card game, "Magic the Gathering" and has worked as an illustrator, created political cartoons, and won numerous wildlife stamp competitions that raised funds for habitat conservation.

Through all of his artistic ventures, nature continues to inspire DJ's work and life: "Spending time in the wilderness, studying the environment and wildlife inspires me to capture the beauty and vitality of nature. For me, my art is the best way to repay what nature has given to me. It is my form of praise, of homage, and of thanks."

CONSERVATION EDITION PRINTS


Each year, WHC donates a variety of prints and other artwork by Canadian wildlife artists to various causes and organizations across the country to support the fundraising efforts of our partners.

To many migratory game bird hunters, the Canadian Conservation Stamp is so much more than just a little picture pasted on the Migratory Game Bird Hunting Permit.


The Stamp is a keepsake and relic of hunting seasons passed that are collected and cherished.

HABITAT CONSERVATION STAMP INITIATIVE

Through a legislative arrangement with Environment and Climate Change Canada (ECCC), WHC receives the revenues from the sale of the Canadian Wildlife Habitat Conservation Stamp, purchased primarily by waterfowl hunters to validate their Migratory Game Bird Hunting Permits. The funds are transferred to WHC through a contribution agreement, supporting ECCC's responsibility for the protection and conservation of habitat, particularly for the conservation of waterfowl pursuant to the Migratory Birds Convention Act.

Habitat Joint Ventures integrate planning, science, governance, partnerships, and management to achieve NAWMP (North American Waterfowl Management Plan) goals in Canada through a programmatic approach.

Pacific Birds Habitat Joint Venture WHC Project Funding: \$100,000

Includes portions of British Columbia, Alaska, Washington, Oregon, California and Hawaii. The British Columbia coastline is a complex of inlets, bays, islands, straits and fjords rising to a diversity of near-shore, inter-tidal and forested habitats. There are over 440 estuaries with tidal wetlands and adjacent floodplains habitats. Over 1 million waterfowl nest along B.C.'s coastline and another 400,000 in its estuaries. Agricultural areas in the region also provide significant habitat and food supply for migrating and wintering waterfowl.

Canadian Intermountain Joint Venture WHC Project Funding: \$70,000

An area of 123.5 million areas (50 million hectares) in the central/southern interior of British Columbia and the eastern Rocky Mountains in Alberta. The CIJV encompasses a diverse landscape of valleys and mountains with grasslands, dry and moist coniferous forests, riparian areas and wetlands, alpine tundra, and pocket desert. Twenty-four waterfowl species breed in the CIJV with an estimated populations of 1.45 million birds. This represents 70% of B.C's and roughly 4% of Canada's breeding waterfowl population.

Prairie Habitat Joint Venture WHC Project Funding: \$301,420

Encompasses 158.4 million acres (64.1 million hectares) in the prairie and aspen parklands of Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, and the Peace-Parkland Region of British Columbia. The Western Boreal Forest program also falls under the PHJV including parts of British Columbia, the Prairie Provinces, and the Yukon and Northwest Territories. The PHJV covers one of the most productive areas for waterfowl in the world. Over half of North America's mid-continent ducks breed within this region.

Eastern Habitat Joint Venture WHC Project Funding: \$615,905

Contains 780 million acres (315 million hectares) in Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland and Labrador. The EHJV supports 30% of Canada's wetlands, including coastal bays and salt marshes, lakeshore marshes, floodplain wetlands and boreal forest wetlands. The EHJV supports a significant portion of the continental populations of American Black Duck, Mallard, Ring-necked Duck, Common Golden-eye, Common Eider (3 subspecies), Green-winged Teal, and Canada Goose (5 populations).



NEWFOUNDLAND AND LABRADOR MURRE CONSERVATION FUND

WHC Project Funding: \$16,100

Murre hunting is a traditional activity and a part of the cultural heritage of Newfoundland and Labrador. The regulations permit only hunters from Newfoundland and Labrador to harvest Murre in Canada and only within the provincial boundaries. Since 2001, Murre hunters have been required to purchase a Migratory Game Bird Hunting Permit, which includes the Canadian Wildlife Habitat Conservation Stamp. It was agreed that an associated portion of Stamp funds from Murre hunters be directed to support Murre conservation activities.

The priorities of the NL Murre Conservation Fund are to fund projects that support the conservation and management of Murre populations and their habitat, and to provide funding for projects that involve the people of Newfoundland and Labrador in the conservation, management, and the sustainable harvest of Murre.



NATURAL HERITAGE CONSERVATION PROGRAM







Canadian Land
Trust Working Group
Representing regional and local
land trusts

In April 2019, the Government of Canada announced an investment of \$100 million over four years in the Natural Heritage Conservation Program (NHCP), as part of Budget 2018's Nature Legacy initiative.

The NHCP is a public-private partnership which aims to assist and support the securement of key conservation areas across Canada, protect habitat for species at risk, enhance connections and corridors and stem the loss of biodiversity.

The Nature Conservancy of Canada, Ducks Unlimited Canada, Wildlife Habitat Canada and a variety of regional and local land trusts represented by the Canadian Land Trust Working Group are working together under the NHCP, with a commitment to protect

200,000 hectares (494,210 acres) of habitat for species at risk that contributes to the goals of Pathway to Canada Target 1. #OurNature

LAND TRUSTS CONSERVATION FUND

Under the NHCP, WHC is providing grant administration services for the Land Trusts Conservation Fund (LTCF), which will provide up to \$4.5 million annually over four years to support Canadian land trusts in securing private lands and private interests in lands.

The work of Canada's land trusts on private land coincides directly with those landscapes at greatest risk of further development and fragmentation and significantly contributes to the protection of habitat and species at risk.

The first year of the program was launched in 2019-2020. The land trust community answered the call to action, and subsequently, 31 projects were approved for funding:




