# **MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR**



The past year has been one of meaningful transition and progress at Wildlife Habitat Canada. After nearly 12 years of dedicated leadership, Executive Director Cam Mack moved on from WHC near the end of the fiscal year. We are deeply grateful to Cam for his vision, tireless efforts, and the strong reputation he helped build for WHC among partners and funders across the country.

Following an extensive search, we were pleased to appoint Jessica Burns as Executive Director. With her deep understanding of WHC's mission and operations, along with the respect and confidence of our staff and board, Jessica has stepped into this role with thoughtful leadership and a clear strategic vision.

WHC continues to deliver national programs that advance wildlife habitat conservation across Canada. The Canadian Wildlife Habitat Conservation Stamp Program remains a cornerstone of our work. Since 1985, the program has invested more than \$64 million in protecting and enhancing 1.43 million acres of habitat nationwide. We are committed to growing the program's impact by enhancing its visibility and attracting greater investment in conservation.

The Community Conservation Action Program (CCAP) also marked a successful milestone, completing its fifth year with strong interest from conservation organizations. A highlight from the past year was Be the Change Earth Alliance's FLOW: Youth Collaborating on Freshwater Action project in British Columbia, which engaged over 3,300 youth in climate and conservation action. To ensure CCAP's long-term success, WHC continues to seek additional support from both public and private funding sources.

Another key initiative is the Natural Heritage Conservation Program – Land Trusts Conservation Fund (NHCP–LTCF), a flagship federal program supporting Canada's conservation commitments. Over the past six years, WHC has supported more than 200 conservation projects, protecting over 21,000 hectares of important wildlife habitat. Our expertise in grant administration and strong partnerships have been critical to this success, and we look forward to shaping the future of national conservation programming.

In the coming year, we will focus on the continued evolution of our business development and communications strategies, ensuring we continue to deliver high-impact, future-focused conservation programming. We are fortunate to be guided by a dedicated and experienced board and staff team, and we remain committed to working collaboratively with our extensive network of partners to make 2025–2026 a dynamic and productive year.

# A LEGACY OF CONSERVATION AND TRADITION: WATERFOWL HUNTING IN CANADA

### **Hunting and Canadian Heritage**

A cornerstone of Canadian identity, hunting is deeply woven into the cultural and historic fabric of the country. From traditional and subsistence hunting to the fur trade and outdoor industry, responsible hunting plays an important role in our economy and heritage.

### Responsible Hunting, Remarkable Art

Wildlife Habitat Canada's (WHC) mission—to conserve wildlife habitat across Canada—has been powered for decades by hunters through the Canadian Wildlife Habitat Conservation Stamp and Print Program.

Every waterfowl hunter in Canada must purchase a Migratory Game Bird Hunting (MGBH) Permit, which includes the Wildlife Habitat Conservation Stamp (the Stamp). The Stamp features unique art depicting migratory game birds and iconic Canadian landscapes painted by a Canadian artist. WHC uses the money generated from the Stamp to support conservation projects from coast to coast.

Since inception in 1984, the Stamp has celebrated over 27 Canadian artists and generated over \$64 million, supporting more than 1,600 conservation projects to conserve and restore over 1.4 million acres of habitat. This direct link between hunting and conservation makes Canada unique: hunters are not only participating in a cultural tradition, they are also financing habitat protection for countless species.

### Honouring a Legacy of Stewardship

Through the Stamp, waterfowl hunters recognize the importance of conservation and good stewardship. WHC ensures that funds raised are invested into projects with lasting ecological benefits—from wetland restoration and species at risk protection, to youth education and Indigenous-led conservation initiatives.

This model highlights the partnership between hunting heritage and conservation success, ensuring that future generations inherit thriving landscapes, sustainable wildlife populations, and opportunities to carry forward this Canadian legacy.

## WILDLIFE HABITAT CONSERVATION STAMP

Since 1985, the Canadian Wildlife Habitat Conservation Stamp and Print (CWHS) program has been supporting wildlife art and important conservation projects all over Canada.

The program continues to enable vital wildlife habitat conservation, research, and education projects across Canada. This year 24 projects were made possible through CWHS sales.

## **COMMUNITY CONSERVATION ACTION PROGRAM**

The Community Conservation Action Program (CCAP) was created by Wildlife Habitat Canada (WHC) to enable smaller organizations to deliver on-the-ground conservation education, nature connection and youth engagement programming in communities across Canada. WHC was able to invest \$50,272 in supporting local projects from 11 organizations to connect more than 8,451 people to nature.

# 2024-2025 DIANE GRIFFIN CONSERVATION AWARD WINNER

Be The Change Earth Alliance is the 2024–2025 recipient of the Diane Griffin Community Conservation Award for their outstanding FLOW: Youth Collaborating on Freshwater Action project in British Columbia. The initiative empowered youth aged 6–18 to take climate action and address eco-anxiety through workshops, outdoor education, and classroom resources.

### Key accomplishments include:

**Workshops:** 364 students participated in 16 two-part workshops, pledging actions that led to the reduction of 1.55 million kg of CO<sub>2</sub>, conservation of 1.32 million litres of water, and reduction of 1,523 kg of plastic waste.

**Outdoor Education:** 7 outdoor sessions engaged 188 youth, including habitat cleanups that removed 44 kg of waste from 4 hectares.

**Learning Resources:** 168 teachers received freshwater conservation education materials, reaching 3,360 students. Over 80 teachers participated in professional development through the project.



# NATURAL HERITAGE CONSERVATION PROGRAM - LAND TRUSTS CONSERVATION FUND

The Natural Heritage Conservation Program (NHCP), established by Environment and Climate Change Canada, directly contributes to Canada's ambitious goal of conserving 30 per cent of our lands and waters by 2030 by enabling its delivery partners to secure and steward natural areas, develop tools and research to accelerate progress on conservation targets and support Indigenous-led conservation initiatives.


Through administering the Land Trusts Conservation Fund (LTCF) component of the NHCP, Wildlife Habitat Canada directly supports local and regional land trusts to protect Canada's natural heritage through land securement and expand Canada's ability to meet nature and people's needs through capacity building.

In the 6<sup>th</sup> year of the program, 2,619.72 hectares were successfully conserved by local and regional land trusts. These lands provide crucial ecosystem services, connection to nature for local communities and provide habitat to countless species, including 41 unique Species at Risk.



### PROJECT HIGHLIGHT: Blanche Peninsula - Nova Scotia Nature Trust

The Blanche Peninsula is one of the last highly biodiverse and intact coastal lands of its size in Nova Scotia. With funding from the NHCP-LTCF, local supporters and federal and provincial governments, this ecological treasure has been protected – forever. Located on the Atlantic Flyway, the property is part of one of the most important coastal peninsulas in Nova Scotia for bird conservation, an incredible 174 bird species have been identified there.
